# Award History

Created in 2014, the ANNIKA Award presented by Stifel is annually given to the top female Division I collegiate golfer; the winner voted on by players, coaches and members of the golf media. Named for and presented by Annika Sorenstam, the award was created in partnership with the Haskins Commission to acknowledge the top female golfer at the end of the season, to match the Haskins Award presented by Stifel which

acknowledges the top male Division I collegiate golfer.

"The Haskins Award has been a prestigious accolade recognizing the best male collegiate players for over 40 years. I am thrilled to work with the Haskins Commission to create the ANNIKA Award to similarly honor the best collegiate female golfers. College golf meant a lot to me - it really helped get my career going in the right direction."

## About Amnika

Annika was born in Stockholm, Sweden on October 9, 1970. She began playing golf at the age of 12, but also occupied her time with badminton, soccer, tennis and competitive skiing. In 1987, Annika joined the Swedish National Golf Team and credits fellow Swede Liselotte Neumann's win at the 1988 Women's Open for heightening her interest in golf. Annika played in the World Amateur Golf Team Championships in 1990 and, again, in 1992 when she won the Championship.

Annika enrolled at the University of Arizona in the fall of 1990 and won seven titles during her collegiate career. She was the first foreign-born player and first freshman to win the individual NCAA Championship. She also won the 1991 National Co-Player of the Year Award, was the 1992 Pac-10 Champion and was named to the 1991-1992 All-American team. In 1992, Annika was a runner-up for the National Player of the Year Award and finished second to Vicki Goetze at the United States Women's Amateur Golf Championship.

## Rose Zhang



#### 2023, 2022 RECIPIENT // STANFORD WOMEN'S GOLF

Ranked No. 1 in WAGR, Rose Zhang had a lights out season in her first year at Stanford. The freshman had a record breaking fall season, winning her first three tournaments, to become the only Stanford golfer - men or women - to win their first three events in school history. In addition to the ANNIKA Award, she won the NCAA Championship and was named WCGA Player of the Year and WCGA Freshman of the Year. Zhang collected the NCAA single season scoring average record with 69.68 and finished second in both the Pac-12 Championship and Stanford Regional. She finished T12 at the 2022



Augusta National Women's Amateur during her second appearance at Augusta. Out of the eleven events Rose played this year, she had ten top 4 finishes, including four wins. She was selected for the 2022 Arnold Palmer Cup and 2022 Curtis Cup to be played this summer and won the Spirit International individual and team titles with Teammate and last year's Award winner, Rachel Heck, for Team USA.




## Rachel Heck



#### 2021 RECIPIENT // STANFORD WOMEN'S GOLF

Rachel Heck dominated her freshman season to become the recipient of the 2021 ANNIKA Award. The Cardinal had an incredible first year showing, winning six tournaments to tie for third-most in school history, including eight top-10 finishes. In addition to the ANNIKA Award, she was named the PING WGCA National Player of the Year, Pac-12 Golfer of the Year, Pac-12 Newcomer of the Year and won the Honda Sport Award for Golf. A first team All-American selection by both the WGCA and Golfweek, Rachel became the third woman to sweep the postseason in NCAA history after winning the conference



championship, regionals, and nationals. She became the first player in Stanford history to claim the NCAA Individual title. She earned an invitation to the Augusta National Women's Amateur where she finished tied for 3rd. Heck also competed in the U.S. Women's Open, making the cut and finished tied for 35th. She was also selected to be a part of Team USA in the 2021 Curtis Cup.

## Nafalie Srimi



#### 2020 RECIPIENT // FURMAN WOMEN'S GOLF

Natalie Srinivasan was a deserving recipient of the 2020 ANNIKA Award. The Furman senior had an incredible fall showing, winning three tournaments, with a total of five top 20 finishes in six tournaments, including four top five finishes. In addition to the ANNIKA Award, she was named the PING WGCA National Player of the Year and was the winner of the inaugural Juli Inkster Senior Award. A first team All-American selection by both the WGCA and Golfweek, Natalie paced the Paladins and the Southern Conference with a 70.78 stroke average over 18 rounds, the best career stroke average ever



for a Paladin women's golfer. She earned an invitation to the Augusta National Women's Amateur for the second-consecutive year. She fired a season-low 67 in the final round of the Moon Golf Invitational and was chosen as team MVP. Srinivasan finished the season as the top-ranked active collegiate women's golfer, according to the final Golfstat rankings.

## Maria Fassi





#### 2019, 2018 RECIPIENT // ARKANSAS WOMEN'S GOLF

Born in Hidalgo, Mexico, Maria Fassi became the first player to win the ANNIKA Award in back-to-back seasons. As a junior, Fassi was named to the WCGA First Team All-American and First Team All-SEC. As the No. 1 ranked player headed into the NCAA Championship, she won the Southeastern Conference Player of the Year. She reached a program record of seven wins and won the program's first individual NCAA Regional title. Fassi set the school single-season record with 25 rounds of par or better and was the Razorbacks' top finisher in eight events. In 2019, the senior had an even better year highlighted

by her individual title at the NCAA Championship. She was Arkansas' second SEC Female Athlete of the Year and second-ever Honda Sport Award recipient. She received her second SEC Player of the Year Award and ANNIKA Award. Named to WGCA First-Team All-American and First-Team All-SEC again, Fassi had a runner-up finish at the inaugural Augusta National Women's Amateur. She broke multiple records for the Razorbacks including a program record with 64 rounds of par or better over her career, best career scoring average with a 72.03 in program history, and owns the top single-season scoring averages in program history.

# Leona Maguire





#### 2017, 2015 RECIPIENT // DUKE WOMEN'S GOLF

Hailing from Ireland, Leona Maguire became the first two-time ANNIKA Award winner, taking home the award for top female collegiate golfer in 2015 and 2017. Maguire broke multiple records during her time at Duke including 3rd in wins over her career, 2nd in top 5 finishes, 2nd in top 10 finishes, 1st in stroke average, 1st in even or under par rounds, T2nd in top 20 finishes, T2nd for tournaments as Duke's top scorer and 1st for rounds in the 60's. As a freshman in 2015, she was named WGCA and Golfweek Player of the Year, WCGA National Freshman of the Year, Golfstat Cup Winner, ACC Player of the

Year, ACC Rookie of the Year, earned three victories and named to WGCA Scholar All-American Team. Her 2016-17 season consisted of similar success with WGCA National Player of the Year, Golfstat Cup Award winner, collected the second lowest stroke average in NCAA history as well as a Duke and ACC single-season record, ACC Player of the Year, won the ACC Individual title for the second time in her career, WGCA First Team All-American, runner-up at the NCAA Championship and helped lead Ireland to a bronze medal at the World Team Amateur Championship. Her junior season consisted of three wins, eight top 5 finishes, nine rounds in the 60's and did not finish lower than T6th in 10 tournaments on the season.


Bronte Law was awarded the ANNIKA Award in 2016. The junior enjoyed a knockout season collecting three Player of the Year awards from PING/WGCA, Golfweek and the Pac-12 Conference. Law led the Bruins in scoring average, posting eight top 10's, including three victories to give her six for her career. She was co-medalist at the NCAA Bryan Regional and was WGCA and Golfweek First Team All-American and an All Pac-12 First Team selection. Lastly, she finished the year as the top-ranked collegiate golfer according to Golfweek.

#### 2014 RECIPIENT // UCLA WOMEN'S GOLF

As the first player to win the ANNIKA Award presented by Stifel, the UCLA Freshman was honored as the top female collegiate golfer in 2014. Lee won three collegiate tournaments in her season at UCLA, including the Pac-12 Championship. She was voted the 2014 Pac-12 Freshman and Player of the Year, as well as WGCA national freshman of the year. She also set a UCLA single season scoring record of 71.0 and became the first player in school history to win the GolfStat Cup - collegiate golf's scoring title.

Alison Lee, Bronte Law, Leona Maguire, Rachel Heck and Rose Zhang have all competed in the Curtis Cup during their amateur careers.




